"AD ORIENTEM": Voices from the Early Church — Eastward Prayer in the Fathers

The practice of facing East in prayer, which we are rediscovering in the *ad orientem* celebration of the Holy Mass, is not a recent preference but an ancient expression of Christian worship. The Church Fathers—those bishops, theologians, and saints of the first centuries—spoke frequently of **turning to the East** as a symbol of Christ, the Light of the World and the direction of His anticipated return. Here is a powerful voice from our tradition:

Tertullian (3rd Century) "In our prayers we look toward the East... We pray looking toward the place of paradise, as a symbolic act." (From *Apology*, Chapter 16)

Reflection: Tertullian sees Eastward prayer as **symbolic of paradise**, the home from which humanity fell and to which Christ restores us.

Once decisions have been made, we recommend penning down these arrangements and placing them alongside your important documents in a safe location. In doing so, you provide guidance when it's needed most, ensuring that, even in absence, your love and thoughtfulness continues to guide and comfort.

First reading Isaiah 66:18-21

Thus says the Lord: 'For I know their works and their thoughts, and the time is coming to gather all nations and tongues. And they shall come and shall see my glory, and I will set a sign among them. And from them I will send survivors to the nations, to Tarshish, Pul, and Lud, who draw the bow, to Tubal and Javan, to the coastlands far away, that have not heard my fame or seen my glory. And they shall declare my glory among the nations. And they shall bring all your brothers from all the nations as an offering to the Lord, on horses and in chariots and in litters and on mules and on dromedaries, to my holy mountain Jerusalem,' says the Lord, 'just as the Israelites bring their grain offering in a clean vessel to the house of the Lord. And some of them also I will take for priests and for Levites,' says the Lord.

Second reading Hebrews 12:5-7, 11-13

Brothers and Sisters: Have you forgotten the exhortation that addresses you as sons? 'My son, do not regard lightly the discipline of the Lord, nor be weary when reproved by him. For the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and chastises every son whom he receives.' It is for discipline that you have to endure. God is treating you as sons. For what son is there whom his father does not discipline? For the moment all discipline seems painful rather than pleasant, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it.

Therefore lift your drooping hands and strengthen your weak knees, and make straight paths for your feet, so that what is lame may not be put out of joint but rather be healed.

Gospel Acclamation

Gospel Luke 13:22-30

At that time: Jesus went on his way through towns and villages, teaching and journeying towards Jerusalem. And someone said to him, 'Lord, will those who are saved be few?' And he said to them, 'Strive to enter through the narrow door. For many, I tell you, will seek to enter and will not be able. When once the master of the house has risen and shut the door, and you begin to stand outside and to knock at the door, saying, "Lord, open to us", then he will answer you, "I do not know where you come from." Then you will begin to say, "We ate and drank in your presence, and you taught in our streets." But he will say, "I tell you, I do not know where you come from. Depart from me, all you workers of evil!" In that place there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth, when you see Abraham and Isaac and Jacob and all the prophets in the kingdom of God but you yourselves cast out. And people will come from east and west, and from north and south, and recline at table in the kingdom of God. And behold, some are last who will be first, and some are first who will be last.'

The Gospel reminds us that the way into God's Kingdom is through the *narrow door*, which is Christ Himself. This path cannot be entered while carrying with us the burdens of anger, violence, or divisive loyalties. Symbols, slogans, and allegiances are never neutral: if they oppose peace, charity, and truth, they cannot pass through the door of Christ.

As Christians, we are called to discernment and to clothe ourselves with humility, compassion, and love, which alone fit through the narrow way. Any attachment that diminishes the dignity of others or

contradicts the Gospel must be set aside,	so that we may	enter freely into	the banquet of t	the Kingdom,
welcomed by the Lord who is Himself our	peace.
